

# Cancer screenings in this day and age

By knowing when to routinely get screened for cancer, you can increase your likelihood of living a long, healthy life with every year. The American Cancer Society's latest guidelines recommend undergoing screenings at these ages for common cancers to give you the best chance of finding the disease—while it's small and before it has spread<sup>1-4</sup>:



## Cervical

Starting at **25**, every **5 years** until **65** 

### Lung

Starting at 50 (for current and former smokers), every 1 year until 80



Starting at 45 (or 40 if recommended), every 1 year until 55, then every 2 years

### Colorectal

Starting at 45, every 10 years until 75 (or 85 if recommended)

#### **Prostate**

Starting at **50** (**only** if recommended)\*

\* Men shouldn't undergo screening for prostate cancer until after they've discussed the uncertainties, risks, and potential benefits
